A delightful contact was from a Dataw Island club member who wrote "...... thought I was keeping up on conservation and preservation, but what the heck is that "Restoration Ecology" you mention in The SC Gardener? I want to know more!".

Isn't it great that our Gardener is being read and questioned!!.


Restoration Ecology is a term coined by Michael Rosenzweig in 2003, but as you read IT, IT really isn't NEW. The scientific definition of Rosenzweigs' term is: "the science of inventing, establishing, and maintaining new habitats to conserve species diversity in places where people live, work and play". What it means to you and me is sharing our present habitat deliberately with other species, to learn how to share within our boundaries, not establishing only artificial habitats of large parks and acreages but in our own community and in our own yard.

In my exploration, I discovered Dr. Madhu Katti, who joined NC State in August 2016, in a Chancellor's Faculty Excellence Program in Leadership in

Public Science. Katti, an associate professor in the Department of Forestry and Environmental Science, studies animals and plants in cities with the goal of applying understanding toward reconciling biodiversity conservation with human development. His research also focuses on the behavioral effects of humans on other species, e.g. effects of urban noise on birdsong.

In email exchanges with Madhu he is so passionate about birds and restoration of habitats that he is very open to speaking engagements in South Carolina. mkatti@ncsu.edu


Coastal District

Memorial Garden Capitol Project - 2018



Dear GCSC Members.

The Memorial Garden is a true beauty spot and GCSC's very own property. A wonderful gift to GCSC from Mrs. Sarah Boyleston in July 1945. Her gracious beguest specified GCSC is responsible for the Memorial Garden's upkeep and is to maintain it as a permanent memorial to the citizens of South Carolina "who have served or will serve in the armed forces of WWII". GCSC accepted this largess and have maintained the Memorial Garden since then. I am sure Mrs. Boyleston would be very proud of GCSC's nurturing and love of the Memorial Garden, which continues to be enjoyed by many garden club members, veterans and citizens of South Carolina.

The last several years GCSC has worked with the Lace House Events Director to offer the Memorial Garden for wedding events. The funds realized from this joint venture have helped GCSC with monthly maintenance costs and long term care of the garden.

As you may know, over the years severe drainage issues have occurred that have resulted in poor grass coverage in certain areas of the garden. We have addressed this with new sod several times during several administrations. Recently, due to heavy rainfall, the unappealing and unattractive look of the grass-less muddy areas, especially at the bottom of the Boyleston Gate steps, has resulted in wedding rentals of the diminished Memorial Garden. The Lace House Director, who works with SCPRT (South Carolina Parks, Recreation and Tourism), is keenly aware of the drainage problem in the garden and the subsequent loss of revenue to GCSC.



The Lace House and SCPRT have Long view of the Memorial Garden offered to help GCSC with this problem. This past spring they paid RML Landscape firm \$9,600 to look at the Memorial Garden and give a report and estimate of the work needed. The plan includes grading the muddy areas, clearing the underground drainage system of roots and debris, modifying the irrigation system, planting new sod and creating a large drainage system at the top of the Boyleston Gate stairs to divert rain water that collects there whenever it rains.

Memorial Garden Capitol Project - 2018 (continued)

The entire project will cost \$38,200. SCPRT and GCSC will each be responsible for \$19,100. The GCSC funds will come from the Memorial Garden Investment Account. This extensive capitol project to preserve the Memorial Garden will be a much-needed underground facelift and the answer to the persistent rainwater that collects in the garden.

The project will start in late September and should be completed in early December. The progress will be updated in the SC Gardener Winter Issue.

Bird Migration Coming to (and Through) South Carolina

Ah, September. Just thinking about this month brings to mind (slightly) cooler temperatures, the promise of Fall, and for me, bird migration. One of the world's greatest phenomena will be taking place this month as millions of birds, pouring down from nesting sites further north, pass through our state on their annual journeys south. Some will arrive in South Carolina and stay for the winter, but for many, we are just a stopover point on a much longer trip.

Just think: you may wake up one morning and have a bird feeding in your yard that could have just flown all night and hundreds of miles, just to wind up eating insects off of your (hopefully native) plants! These migrants include warblers and tanagers, vireos and thrushes — all following that internal instinct to wander, only to return again next spring.

Luckily for all of us, bird migration is a statewide spectacle in South Carolina. No matter where you live, there are migration hotspots that are certainly worth visiting this time of year if you hope to catch a glimpse of these transient visitors.

To determine just where to find these hotspots, it's helpful to know a little about bird migration, especially the paths that birds take while flying south. While much is still unknown about exactly *how* birds accomplish this feat, it is believed that Earth's magnetism and celestial cues aid in navigation, while geographic formations — such as mountains, rivers and coastlines — can help funnel birds into relatively concentrated areas.

So when I'm planning a birding trip during migration, I head for places that are associated with these geographic landmarks. If you live in the Upstate, the state parks near the foothills of the Appalachians are great places to visit, including Jones Gap, Caesar's Head, Table Rock and Oconee. In addition to songbirds, Caesar's Head State Park is perhaps the best place in South Carolina to witness raptor migration, as thousands of hawks, eagles and other species pass through the Carolinas. The South Carolina Botanical Gardens in Clemson is also an excellent birding spot during the fall.

In the Midlands and the Aiken/Augusta areas, think river corridors. Congaree National Park outside of Columbia offers some excellent hiking and birding. Silver Bluff Audubon Center, along the Savannah River, is another great spot to visit.

If you live near the coast, there is no shortage of places to check out. Huntington Beach State Park near Murrells Inlet is a must-visit. In

addition to songbirds at this park, it's an excellent place to see migrating shorebirds and seabirds. In the Charleston area, I like Lighthouse Inlet Heritage Preserve, located at the north end of Folly Beach. Birds crossing the harbor often land at this southern edge and feed in the maritime forest, while shorebirds and seabirds can often be seen roosting along the beach.

The Beaufort/Hilton Head area has its own list of hotspots, including Savannah and Pinckney Island National Wildlife Refuges and Hunting Island State Park.

Regardless of where you live, I urge you to get outside this migration season and enjoy this wonderful wildlife spectacle. We are lucky to have such a diversity of birds that call South Carolina home, even if only for a short time. And remember that, wherever you are, there are easy things that you can do for birds during this crucial time of year to help provide them with safe passage. Planting native plants, providing fresh water in a birdbath, and keeping cats indoors-especially at dawn and dusk-are all birdfriendly habits that will provide a helping hand to these birds that we all love so dearly.



Unit One Garden Club - "Garden Time in the South"

In the 1930s, Mattie Abney Hartzog began keeping a gardening diary as well as a scrapbook of articles on horticulture. She filled ledger after ledger with her handwritten comments on everything from bulbs, boxwoods and birds to the vagaries of weather in her hometown of Greenwood, S.C Those ledgers would evolve into her 370-page book, "Garden Time in the South." Published in 1951 by J. Horace McFarland Co. of Harrisburg, Penn., it can now be found in university and public libraries from Delaware and Florida to Michigan and California.

In 1952, the book earned the top award for horticultural literature given by the National Council of State Garden Clubs. Presented to Mrs. Hartzog at the state meeting of South Carolina garden clubs held at Lander College, now Lander University, in Greenwood, the citation from the national president and the awards chairman read, "In recognition of distinguished

service in compiling and publishing material of extraordinary value in the advancement of gardening."

Born in 1887, Mrs. Hartzog was a charter member and past president of Unit One Garden Club, the first garden club organized in Greenwood, S.C., in 1928. Recently her niece by marriage, Josephine B. Abney, donated a copy of her aunt's book to the club.

Mrs. Abney is 99 years old, though she refers to herself as 99 going on 120. Both Mrs. Abney and her Aunt Mattie's book have stood the test of time. Mrs. Abney is still an active member of Unit One. Her aunt's book is still a valuable resource for developing a garden in the South. It covers everything from soil preparation to seasonal tasks and plant selection. Also invaluable are her monthly suggestions for garden club programs.

Whether current garden clubbers check out the book in their local libraries or are lucky enough to locate a copy through eBay or Amazon, they will discover a kindred gardening spirit through Mattie Abney Hartzog's writings.

Those who love working in their gardens will instantly relate to the pleasure and problems of gardening as conveyed by Mrs. Hartzog in her

diary section. What a picture she paints in this entry from May 8: "Our 'field' of poppies is delightful sight, with larkspurs scattered about it and honeysuckle growing on a fence as a background. don't mind seeing 'something going,' such as bulb foliage dying, for there much 'coming on.' including swan daisies (Brachycome). painted daisies



(Pyrethrum) and coreopsis. Our idea of a real garden is something going, something coming and something at its best all the time."

Mrs. Hartzog reveals herself as a practical and practicing gardener. Information on the book's jacket notes: "Color, harmony, fragrance, outdoor living and plants for special purposes are treated fully and understandingly. Evergreen and deciduous trees especially good in the South are listed and described. Minor features such as hedges and ground covers are not overlooked. One helpful chapter tells how to raise the most important garden specialties such ad daffodils, roses, azaleas and boxwood, in the South. Vegetables, fruit and herbs receive consideration."



Then there are Mrs. Hartzog's month-by month suggestions for garden club programs. For instance, she lists the following topics for April:

- A garden for fragrance.
- Vines for the garden.
- Rock gardens, how to make; suitable plants.
- Lily pools, how to construct; formal, naturalistic.
- Talk on period gardens. Discussion: landscaping and planting communities.
- Famous South Carolina gardens. (Suggests other state gardens for various months.)

Mrs. Hartzog goes one step farther recommending a floral display for each month. Her

April suggestion is a "display specimen tulip or arrangement in which tulips are used for the living room."
